Who?

Besides the involvement of various speakers including the anthropologist [David Graeber](#), the sociologists [Hillary Wainwright](#) and [Dario Padovan](#), the Global Teach-In wants you to get involved!

You will participate and shape the discussion in local/regional workshops and thematic groups. Thus the audience will become the active participant to balance, critic and reconfigures experts' ideas. We will link the best of vertical information flow and horizontal accountability.

How?

The Global Teach-In takes place in three parts:

- Global Broadcast (for a global audience)
- Local Meetings (involving persons in your region or country)
- Thematic Meetings (the global network broken into about five groups)

Where?

We are in 26 locations of 19 countries worldwide and will broadcast the event live on Facebook and Zoom. You can attend a local, national or transatlantic meeting in the languages of the participating regions, i.e. English, German, Swedish, Italian.

The global broadcast will be in English.

What?

The immediate goal is to advance:

- knowledge and resources between the organizers and local communities;
- advancement of short-term solutions;
- promotion of long-term structural reforms;
- creation of organisational bridges through reconstructive institutions;
- testing long-term and short-term proposals;
- integration of different issues;
- creation of a political focal point and the media.

These seven principles provide a way to #DemocratizetheCrisis. A global meeting like this is an ideal platform to advance the idea and practice of "transnational social production networks" in which design, innovation, production and related capabilities are reused to meet social needs.

Ultimately we need democracy on a local, regional, national and global basis, extending the capacities of individuals and groups, linking critical knowledge and ethical outcomes.
