**Principles of Roman Law**

**COURSE SUMMARY**

The course is designed to teach students basic notions of Roman private law. After an elementary description of Roman institutions and Roman law sources, the course shows the elementary growth patterns of Roman law of persons, property and obligations.

**LEARNING OBJECTIVES**

The course aims to make students acquire knowledge of the essential categories of legal thinking in the European private law, which is based on Roman law sources and the legal thought therein contained. It also aims to give students tools to understand how historical development and consequent changes by its stemmed are a key future to understand law process in ongoing societies. The visiting professor would cover part of the course, especially the one devoted to the law of property.

**OTHER ACTIVITIES BESIDE THE COURSE**

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### **VISITING PROFESSOR PROFILE**

The visiting professor is required to have a Ph.D. from Law, possibly from an European University, as well as to give evidence of research periods carried on in primary world University. She/he is also required to have a recognized profile in the field of history and philosophy of law, witnessed by essays in the field of Roman Law, History of Law, Jurisprudence and possibly also Private Law. She/he is also required to have an international reputation, witnessed by conferences held in prestigious workshops, seminars and international congresses. Evidence of networking already carried on by the visiting professor would be appreciated. The visiting professor must also cover a tenure position in a prestigious University or in an outstanding Universitarian law research centre. Finally she/he is required to master at least 4 of the 5 main European languages, that is to say English, French, German, Italian and Spanish. Of course she/he is required to have proficiency in English and in Italian.
